A NOTE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

In my Annual Report letter last year, I wrote that we were experiencing a season of transition and even upheaval. That trend has continued, and Interfaith Coalition is still seeking new equilibrium. We have faced ongoing staffing changes and we have also had to reevaluate some of our alliances with partner agencies in our community, strengthening some and moving away from others. We have already had to make some difficult decisions as we adjust our sails to the winds of change that have swept through our organization, and there are more to come.

In the midst of this organizational change, there has still been much to celebrate. Volunteers have shown up for Interfaith Coalition in a multitude of ways; providing meal kits for families in emergency shelter, lending valuable support to our Winter Coat Drive, and meeting special family needs, like diapers for the two babies born into our housing program this year. Time and again, we have felt gratitude for the vitality and variety of support we receive for our mission and the families we serve.

We are now preparing to go deeper into a season of evaluation as our Board of Directors and staff consider a multitude of options for the future of Interfaith Coalition. We will also be asking for input from our member congregations as we go through this process. Though it is unnerving at times to stare down an uncertain future, this is also a season of hope. I recently read the following reflection from Richard Rohr, which I view as especially relevant for us today;

"Hope is not primarily for the future. It's for now! Hope is a way of seeing time and understanding the present. It's a way of tasting and receiving the moment. It gives us the capacity to enter into the future in a new way. In that sense, we can call hope true realism, because hope takes seriously all the many possibilities that fill the moment."

On behalf of Interfaith Coalition as we make more room for hope in this liminal space, I extend gratitude to those of you who have walked with us on this winding path. In our 42-year history, we have navigated many turns in the road while still keeping our focus on serving families in our community, and I believe we will continue to do that for many years to come.

OUR VOLUNTEERS







This year, **hundreds of volunteers** lent a hand to support projects like the Winter Coat Drive, Holiday Joy, Project Warm-Up, meal kit deliveries and numerous landscaping and home improvement projects, dedicating **thousands of hours** of their own time to help families, children, and individuals in need around Whatcom County.

Families look many different ways, and all are welcome and valued in IFC housing. One intergenerational family (grandma, her adult daughter and son, and her young granddaughter) has celebrated multiple milestones since moving into IFC emergency shelter. Last summer, the granddaughter celebrated her "sweet sixteen" and has since started working her first job. Grandma has been experiencing significant health challenges and underwent two major surgeries in the past six months. And most recently, the son/brother/uncle's application for the Housing Choice Voucher was selected by the Housing Authority so he can move into his permanent home! This family has navigated many ups and downs, and they have been able to use IFC emergency shelter as a place of respite, rejuvenation, and now a launching pad for the next steps of their journey.

WINTER COAT DRIVE

Thank you to every one of you who helped us give out 2,500+ free coats, hats, scarves, and gloves to 500 families and individuals around Whatcom County. Without you, many children, teens, and adults in our neighborhoods may only have a tattered and worn coat to shield them against our wet, chilly winter. With this community effort, though, hundreds of people got to "shop" for a new-tothem coat.



Our Winter Coat Drive is an effort of thousands. A dozen congregations held coat drives, Ridwell featured winter coats so their subscribers could easily donate from their front porch, Ragfinery offered space to accept donations, Brandon Nelson Partners Realtors provided their box truck, Bellingham Food Bank provided a home base to give out coats in Bellingham. Congregants and volunteers, including Marta Hand and Loretta Tedrow of United Church of Ferndale and Marie Valum of St. Peter Mission in Deming gave generously of their time and energy so we could broaden the reach of our coat drive. Ronalee Kincaid takes the helm on Project Warm-Up, organizing donations of yarn and knitted and crocheted hats and scarves year-round so these beautiful, handmade items could be given away at our winter coat distributions, as well as many other locations and outreach programs around Whatcom County.










PROPOSED BUDGET 2023/2024 - 6-month budget
