#### A HOME FOR HOMEWORK

CCT T i Dot, what's for dinner?" called out one pre-teen boy, as 10 children and four moms poured through the doors of St. Paul Episcopal Church's hall. Family Promise volunteer Dot Nichols other parishioners were ready to serve a hot meal, help with homework, and offer overnight accommodations for a week to local families experiencing homelessness.

Volunteers make sure children have a warm and happy place conducive to homework while their parents work toward long-term housing. Families stay in the program about seven weeks, with 94% of them graduating into stable, longterm housing.

"Our church has four large round tables where we gather," Dot says. "After dinner, there's plenty of space. It's important for children to have a table, comfortable chair, and good lighting, which they certainly wouldn't have in the back of a van, or a tent." Volunteers can help the youngsters, one on one if necessary.

appreciated by a child," Dot says. "It's powerful to see Christ in the faces of the people who come to us: the children, the moms, the dads. We have so much love. How wonderful to be able to share it, and be loved back. You can feel the gratitude."

Dot is one of seven Family Promise volunteer coordinators at St. Paul's. "We worked hard to get everybody on board throughout the parish. That's paid off! That's how we get 50 volunteers for a week, four times a year."

A retired counselor at elementary schools and Western Washington University, Dot especially

enjoys interacting with children. Her bright moments are many. One 10-yearold boy came in "a loner," but connected with a volunteer who encouraged him in his homework assignment of writing a comic-book story. "That boy was so proud of his book, and so happy with himself," Dot says.

"It feels great when we turn out our Great Hall lights, and 14 of God's children are warm, safe, and comfortable for another night."
